Art Fair Awards

The letters regarding contributions to the 59th AAUW Art Fair on the Green will be sent to all members via email. The categories remain the same: Purchase Awards, Artists' Awards and Scholarship Fund.

Artists' Award Fund

Member donations comprise the chief source of funding for the 4 artist awards. A pair of art experts selects the recipients. In total, we give \$1000 of award money to the artist recipients. By so doing, we maintain the high quality of exhibitors at the Art Fair on the Green and offer an incentive to new Art Fair participants as well as to returning artists.

Donations to this fund are tax-exempt.

Purchase Awards

To attract the finest available artists, we offer the opportunity to pre-commit funds to purchase art during the Art Fair. Purchase award patrons provide considerable support for our outstanding artists.

The purchaser designates a dollar amount (\$100 or more) and, prior to the fair, gives that amount to the Art Fair purchase award fund. When the purchaser arrives at the fair she/he selects one or more items and informs the committee chairs what has been chosen. The AAUW Art Fair pays the artist. This is NOT tax exempt.

Checks for Artists' Awards & Purchase Awards should be made payable to *AAUW Art Fair on the Green*.

Checks to the Scholarship Fund should be written to the *La Crosse Community Foundation*, with the notation "for AAUW Scholarships" in the memo.

Suffragist Statue Trapped In Closet for 75 years



In 1921, six months after the 19th amendment was ratified, an assembly of more than 70 women's organizations and members of Congress gathered at the Capitol Rotunda for the unveiling of a massive statue. The Portrait Monument, by sculptor Adelaide Johnson, shows Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony and Lucretia Mott in towering white marble.

The very next day, the statue was moved underground. On multiple occasions, Congress refused to approve bills that would've brought the statue back into the light. On May 14, 1997, the statue was finally moved back to the Rotunda using money raised from donors around the country.

Amplifying Our Voices Together

Jan Eriksen and I attended the AAUW Wisconsin State Convention on April 21-22 in Neenah. Below are some highlights of the two days.

One of Friday's keynote speakers was Eileen Hartmann, who is a member of the national board of directors of AAUW. She highlighted the year's activities and initiatives, especially in the public policy area. She made special mention of her fellow board member, Pam Thiel, who is a La Crosse branch member, as well the article in the current Outlook about our branch hosting of the World Services' Kosovo delegation.

Jan and I went to breakout sessions for presidents and fund development, as well as the meeting for District 4.

The keynote speaker for the Saturday luncheon was Mary Burke, businesswoman, philanthropist and social entrepreneur. The sharing of her journey to become the first Wisconsin women to win the gubernatorial nomination of a major party was riveting. She is an inspiring speaker who tied her remarks to the convention's theme. While she lost the race, she discovered her most confident self and wanted to share this with other women. Building Brave is an online community of women who inspire, encourage and empower each other to discover and be their most confident selves. Jan and I attend the final session on collaboration with other organizations. We brainstormed about new groups that we may want to research and seek out for engagement. 
It proved to be an informative conference and we were glad to get an insight into the larger world of state and national AAUW.

Public Policy

One Step Forward:

The Healthy Families Act (HFA) (HR 1516/S 636) would require employers with 15 or more employees to grant seven paid sick days per year to care for themselves or a family member. This benefit would have far-reaching implications for the financial, physical and emotional well-being of families. Additionally, as working parents often must ask older children to stay home to care for younger children, HFA greatly improves the education experience of children. HR 1516 has been referred to the House Committees on Education and the Workplace, and Oversight and Governmental Reform. S 636 has been referred to the Senate



Committee on Health Education Labor and Pensions. Contact your elected officials to urge their support!

One Step Backward:

On May 2, 2017, The US House of Representatives passed the Working Families Flexibility Act (WFFA) (HR 1180). The Act amends the Fair La-

bor Standards Act (FLSA) to allow private sector employers to grant employees compensatory time off rather than monetary overtime for extra time at work. The employer must reach agreement with the employee in advance of work performed. However, the WFFA allows employers to deny an employee's request to use compensatory time if the request would "unduly disrupt" business operations. Additionally, the Act does not authorize new Department of Labor (DOL) resources to educate employees regarding their rights nor to ensure employers comply with the Act. Last, the WFFA does not provide for administrative recourse for employees to contest violations of the Act, forcing individuals to file actions in court, both costly and time consuming. The WFFA will proceed to the Senate for consideration.

Working women and families should be properly compensated for extra time at work, and are entitled to fair protection against employers who deny employees their rights. Contact Senators Baldwin and Johnson to voice your concern about the WFFA.
