Marlene was invited to public service by President Obama in 2012 as a participant in the White House Advisory Council for Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships. That experience acquainted her with issues in human trafficking.

"I cannot start a movement, but I can answer a calling. And sometimes that can lead to a movement," Marlene recently said about becoming the Convener of the La Crosse Task Force to Eradicate Modern Slavery in 2013. The Task Force now has 50 members who are educators, members of law enforcement, social workers, YWCA representatives, and more, & gives 45-50 presentations each year about this fundamental human rights crime.

Join us for more information, to learn the signs for recognizing a person in jeopardy, and to take home free resources on human trafficking. Find out what you can do to help. 
At the April 8th meeting, we'll be helping out the YWCA Teen group by collecting arts & crafts supplies like beading, paper, paints, markers, crayons.

Public Policy

Protecting your investment



In February, a federal judge upheld the US Dept of Labor Fiduciary Rule after a challenge from the US Chamber of Commerce and other groups. The rule requires financial advisors to act in the

interest of their client when providing retirement advice. In late March, the plaintiffs request to block the rule while the case is on appeal was denied. If the new administration takes no action, the Fiduciary Rule will go into effect Apr 10,2017.

Protecting Equality, State by State

On March 22, Nevada became the 36th state to ratify the Equal Rights amendment, 45 years after it was passed by Congress and sent to the states.



Fighting for Access to Justice

Class action litigation is an important tool in achieving justice for individual victims of discrimination, but also



policy changes and other systemic remedies. On March 12, the House passed the Fairness in Class Act Litigation Act (HR 985), severely undermining class action in civil rights cases. The Act adds years to a lawsuit by adding automatic appeals to

the certification of a class of plaintiffs, and more delays in discovery of documents. The Act effectively denies access for those seeking justice, and fails to deter those who engage in illegal discrimination. Contact Senators Baldwin and Johnson to vote no to this critical erosion of civil rights enforcement. See AAUW legal advocacy webpage for more information.
