#### Remove the Crime of Sexual Assault from the Military Chain of Command

26,000.

No, that's not what the Dow closed at yesterday. It's how many service members, male and female, that a recent Pentagon study estimated were sexually assaulted in 2012. That figure is up from 19,000 in 2010. Other surveys of female veterans have found that close to one-third were victims of rape or assault while they were serving, which is double the rate in the civilian population. This problem is even worse in conflict zones, with half of the women serving in Iraq or Afghanistan reporting sexual harassment and nearly one in four reporting sexual assault. This is unacceptable and must change.

The Pentagon has been aware of this problem for decades, yet it persists. It's time for Congress to act and take the crime of military sexual assault out of the chain of command and give this authority to an independent body.

Contact your representative and senators today and tell them to remove sexual assault from the chain of command.
