# **Public Policy**

Here's an update on the state of equal pay initiatives in the country. In 2017, 42 states, Puerto Rico, and Washington, D.C., offered legislative solutions to the gender pay gap. Not all of these bills passed, although the sheer number of legislative efforts is positive. Five states, California, Colorado, Delaware, Nevada, and



Oregon, and Puerto Rico passed legislation aimed at closing the gender pay gap through various individualized strategies.

In California, Delaware, Oregon, and Puerto Rico bills were passed to prohibit employers from using a job applicant's salary history during the hiring process. This was a big win for these states, since asking applicants about past wages can have significant negative consequences on future pay. When salary history is used to set future salary an assumption is made that previous pay was equitable. If a worker was underpaid at her past job, using that salary to establish her next paycheck only sustains the pay gap. Questions about salary history may unintentionally introduce bias and discrimination into the employment process. This type of legislation will go a long way in our fight for pay equity.

It's also important for employees to have access to information so they know if they are being paid unfairly. Many states already protect employees asking for this information. In 2017, Colorado, Nevada, and Puerto Rico enacted or expanded these protections. Oregon and Puerto Rico expanded legislation for victims of discrimination by increasing penalties or damages of wronged employees.

If you are wondering what you can do to help, Elizabeth Holden, AAUW Grassroots Advocacy Manager has some ideas:

- Be an advocate
- Build relationships with your legislators
- Schedule a meeting with your state legislators to introduce yourself and AAUW
- Show up at community meetings or town halls to talk about issues
- Let policymakers see you as a resource.
