#### Membership and Dues Statistics

AAUW is growing. The National Organization has 170,00 members in 1000 branches. Each member contributes \$49 to national. There are 800 College and University partners. All three of our higher ed institutions belong for a fee of \$250. Wisconsin branches together have 1,798 members. Our membership fee to state is \$13. The La Crosse Branch has 85 members but the number for the 2017/18 year isn't final. Only \$8 of the yearly dues stays in our treasury.

As the new Chair of Public Policy, I thought it would be helpful to review the AAUW Public Policy Principles and Public Policy Priorities. The 2017-2019 Priorities are in step with:

"AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research and speak to women's needs, aspirations, and concerns across the life span"

(AAUW Resources, Public Policy Priorities, 2017).

AAUW's Public Policy Principles come from over 130 years of positive activism at the local, state, national and international levels. AAUW opposes all forms of discrimination and supports constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals. The assumption is that there are appropriations necessary to meet needs, that there is an administration that is effective and accountable, and that everyone has the opportunity to participate. AAUW strives for transparency where everyone has a voice and participates in making decisions about these principles. It's important to note that AAUW's public policy efforts are based on the consideration that true equity entails "a balance between the rights of the individual and the needs of the community"

AAUW's Public Policy Principles state: • High quality education is the basis for gender equity and economic prosperity. • Economic, social, and physical well-being of all individuals is endorsed. • Individuals have the right to privacy and freedom from violence. • Improving racial, ethnic, and gender justice is a priority. • Global interdependence mandates policies against human trafficking at the national and international levels.

The 2017-2019 Public Policy Priorities are as follows: • To support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity. • To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women. • To guarantee equity, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society.

I'm excited to be part of our La Crosse chapter. You can see there's a lot of work to be done. I'll keep you informed of AAUW national trends and initiatives. I look forward to working with our intern, Kathryn Draper, Andrea Hansen, and Betty Kruck.
