
PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE:

Art Fair Report

The 59th annual Art Fair on the Green was held the weekend of July 29 & 30 with great weather and great crowds. Even with the construction on the UW-L grounds, we were able to fit in all of the 90 artists and 8 food vendors and a music group! The new layout and new gate by the bell tower were well received.

The preliminary financials show that we took in revenue of \$14,928 for gate receipts, raffle and water sales. Additionally, we have approximately \$ 10,000 in vendor fees. These numbers do not include the money donated to the scholarship fund. Overall, I feel confident that we will have another very successful year and that we will be able to award our generous amount in scholarships and grants next May.

Thank you to all who volunteered their time this year. I appreciate your willingness to do whatever it takes to ensure that everything is handled. Everyone is willing to jump in when asked and I am thankful for all of you.



Public Policy

Watch this column in the October issue for contributions from Pat Markos, our new Public Policy Chair. She is excited about researching and sharing information from AAUW National and other sources that impact our mission. Pat is a new member this year, but held membership several years ago and was Program Co-Chair.

Below is a repeat of the news emailed to you recently about the effort to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment. This information was forwarded to us from Peter Nelson of the La Crosse League of Women Voters.



Equal Rights Amendment advocate, Janette Dean, who graduated from La Crescent High School in 1984 has returned back to the area from the West Coast to help take care of her aging parents now in Caledonia, MN.

Janette was the lead grassroots organizer for Nevada ratification of the ERA on March 22 this year as the 36th state to do so of 38 needed. AAUW was one of the strongest organizations in Nevada supporting the effort. We now need just 2 more states of the 14 left for the required ratification of the ERA by 3/4 of 50 states.

In addition, Janette and ERA proponents want Congress to lift the old 1982 deadline on ratification of the ERA to better encourage and validate the final ratifications. Just like liberty or justice, equality in a democratic Constitution should have no deadline!


Janette is therefore asking for our regional help and has two requests:

1) She would like as many people as possible to read, print and sign the letter she wrote for U.S. Senator Chuck Grassley from lowa. It asks him as Chair of the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee to fairly allow a hearing on Senate Joint Resolution 5 for Congress to eliminate the ERA ratification deadline. Janette is asking that it be mailed or faxed to his Des Moines office during Congress' August recess. The letter can be found on our website: www.aauwlacrosse.org.

FYI: There will be an ERA rally in D.C. on Women's Equality Day on August 26, and Janette will also be speaking about the ERA in the unratified state of Missouri that same day in St. Louis.

2) Janette would also to like to ask AAUW members and La Crosse area women and men to join her at special screening of the new documentary film about the ERA called "Equal Means Equal." The film will be shown on Wednesday, September 13 at Marcus La Crosse Cinema at 2032 Ward Avenue from 7:30-9:40 pm which includes Janette's brief 10 minute introduction and Q&A afterward. At least 67 tickets need to be reserved by Sept. 6 so she is requesting that we each preview the film trailer and make our own online reservations for \$10 ticket(s) if we can come.





Thank you on behalf of Janette. We are proud she is working hard to help the U.S. complete ratification of the ERA and will also host the new documentary about it in our area on September 13. Hope to see you there!

Copies of the letter to sign will be available at AAUW events and other venues in La Crosse, including at the Marcus Cinema on September 13th.

- 1. Dr. Robert Richardson told me about AAUW and thought I would like being involved in the organization and the many programs and initiatives available for members.

- 3. There are so many important issues for women today, it's hard to name just one. My whole professional life I've advocated for women who are homeless or living in poverty. 
