decorative designers in the late nineteenth century. Let's hope for a beautiful day with natural light so that when we tour the museum we can gaze upon an "... extraordinary stained glass window designed by Louis J. Millet, with ornate mosaic beneath it." The main building also features different types of marble and mosaics made of glass tiles as well as semi-precious stones and other natural materials. And of course, we will learn all about Watkins which has made Winona so well known for the products they make for health and home.

The history of the Watkins Company began in Plainview, MN in 1868 as a door-to-door sales business in which natural ingredients were used by J.R. Watkins to make household and health products. Women's March Madison

Saturday, January 21, 2017, 3.3 million U.S. residents participated in the 500 local and national freedom marches known as the Women's March. I traveled with other Sparta women to join 75,000+ women, men and children from all over

Wisconsin. Everyone was there--grandparents, babies, students, parents, young adults and elders, workers and retirees--all ages, ethnicities, faith traditions, genders, abilities and walks of life.

How did it feel to march in such a massive people-parade? Awesome, fun, energizing and incredibly touching. There were signs that broke my heart: "I am a survivor of rape. Protect the Violence Against Women Act" and "The ACA keeps my brother alive". Others made me laugh: "Even the Introverts are here".

I saw my country's democratic ideals and felt such pride. Our Constitution and Bill of Rights were on full display that day; the right to freedom of speech, the right to peaceful assembly and the right to petition our government. I saw our country's religious diversity represented in the marchers, too. "This is what democracy looks like!" was my favorite chant.

It was an honor to march with tens of thousands of Wisconsinites who care about protecting our freedoms and the well-being of our children and families.



Standing Against Bias and Bigotry

AAUW members marched around the world in January. Nearly 5,000,000 people participated in the Washington DC march and 670 sister marches for equality and tolerance. Keep the energy moving forward!




AAUW has joined over 100 civil rights and religious organizations in support of the Protect American Families Act (PAFA) (S 54), introduced January 5, 2017, and now referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. PAFA would block the establishment of an immigration-related registry of people based on religion, race, age, gender, ethnicity, national origin or nationality. Contact Senators Baldwin and Johnson to urge their support of PAFA!



Champions for Equality: Read The Firebrand and the First Lady, by Patricia Bell-Scott, PhD, professor emerita, University of Georgia. This fascinating work explores the friendship of Pauli Murray, civil rights activist/lawyer, and First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt as both women worked to advance the cause of equality. Dr. Bell-Scott, winner of a 1984 AAUW American Fellowship, is a pioneer

researcher into the barriers black women face in academia. Please see the AAUW homepage for more information.

Supreme Women: On March 28, author Linda Hirschman will host an AAUW online book discussion of her work. Sisters in Law, a dual biography of Supreme Court Justices Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg. Hirschman details the differences between the two Justices, "Republican and Democrat, Christian and Jew, western rancher's daughter and Brooklyn girl," and how together they helped shape the jurisprudence of women's legal rights.
