





## **Public Policy**

Many women and men have come forward recently talking about their sexual harassment experiences. I'm going to speak specifically about the impact this has on women. The pervasiveness of sexual harassment and sexual assault impacts women's lives and has major implications for them in terms of their workplace. In listening to all of the recent stories coming out about sexual harassment and assault, it's important to realize that this is really less about sex and more about women's equality in the workplace. It's about the power structures that makes it harder for women to do work because too often the whole thing is tipped toward men. Sexual assault is one outcome of this balance, although it's not the only one. The stories we are hearing are about women looking for work, not for dates or relationships. Instead what they encountered was nonconsensual contact, violent physical and sexual threat, rape, and assault.

Have you ever left a career to avoid harassers? I have. Have you received less pay for the same exact job as a man in the same position? I have. Have you ever faced retaliation for speaking out and telling supervisors about the harassment? I have. For those women who do, there are serious lingering mental and physical health repercussions.

As women and men, we all struggle with the current public reckoning on sexual harassment and assault. AAUW is here to help by providing resources and advocacy opportunities. Remember, we are stronger together!
