According to Josh's description, "Western's investment in a threebay greenhouse, complete with community and potting rooms as well as a state-of-the-art control system, is helping to advance our agriculture and horticulture education. Within the greenhouse, two bays are dedicated to Western students. We highlight various growing technologies including flood tables, misting systems, drip systems, hydroponics, aeroponics, aquaponics, and light controlled grow benches. The greenhouse allows us to integrate our food production efforts with our campus restaurants. Additionally, each year in January, students begin raising edible and ornamental plants for their annual plant sale, which takes place in April. A third growing bay is dedicated for use by Hillview Urban Agriculture, in conjunction with the Get Growing partnership between Mayo, Hillview and Western. Together, we are advancing the local foods movement while providing real world applications in learning."

### **Gun Violence Prevention Update**

Since the tragedy at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida I'm very proud to report that several AAUW branches and state organizations are now involved in gun violence prevention efforts focusing on school safety and gender-related work, as it aligns with AAUW's mission. This is further supported by AAUW's Public Policy Priorities that states, "AAUW recognizes that gun violence is a public health crisis" and that we advocate "freedom from violence and fear of violence, including hate crimes, in homes, schools, workplaces, and communities."

Additionally, "AAUW is proud to support the March for Our Lives events this weekend. Members are welcomed to join this and other local efforts towards gun violence prevention. Together we will call for students' lives and safety to become a priority and the end to gun violence and mass shootings in schools (AAUW in the Statehouse, March 2018)".

### Washington Update

#### **Top Stories**

The U.S. House of Representatives planned on releasing a spending bill this week. As of now, progress on the proposal continues to stall. With funding is set to expire on March 23, here are a few take-a-ways relevant to AAUW:

- Immigration deal unlikely: It looks like funding will not be included for the border wall. Democrats rejected the White House proposal for \$25 billion in wall funding in exchange for a two-year extension of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program.
- Sexual harassment unlikely: Congressional leaders on both sides were working together for a bipartisan overhaul of the policies for deterring and punishing workplace harassment. Now it looks like there will not be any reforms included in the spending bill since a public release date is hours away and there is a Friday deadline to avert a government shutdown.
- Obamacare stabilization unlikely: A bipartisan push to fund Obamacare costsharing subsidies and reinsurance now appears on life support. Democrats have drawn a hard line over adding Hyde prohibitions on the Federal funding of abortion as part of the Obamacare stabilization package.
- In addition, women's health riders, including proposals to eliminate funding for Planned Parenthood or limit women's access to reproductive health care, have also delayed the release of the package.

### State Spotlight

AAUW of Alabama members are advocating for their state's first equal pay bill! H.B. 368, sponsored by Alabama State Rep. Adline Clarke (D-Mobile) would make it illegal for employers to pay lower wages based on sex for similar work. There are only two states without an equal pay law. With AAUW members' advocacy, Alabama may get an equal pay law.

Equal Pay Day is April 10, 2018



Equal Pay Day is an opportunity to raise awareness about the gender gap in our area. Did you know that in Wisconsin, the median annual pay for a woman with a full-time job is \$38,594 while the median annual pay for a man with a full-time job is \$49,306? In other words, women in Wisconsin are paid 78 cents for every dollar paid to men, making for an annual wage gap of \$10,712. This wage gap is even bigger for women of color. Among women living in Wisconsin holding full-time jobs, Black women make 62 cents, Latinas 53 cents, and Asian women 64 cents for every dollar made by white, non-Hispanic men.
