
> with the direction that National is moving, particularly in light of their dues increase. Please take some time to look at the

AAUW Washington Update



Did you know that April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month? We need to be talking about how to prevent sexual harassment and violence, especially in our schools. Students on college campuses are being affected dis-

proportionately and it is negatively impacting their ability to fully participate in educational programs. Title IX, the legislation in place to protect students from unlawful sexual harassment and sexual assault, has recently been rolled back by the Department of Education. This is of great concern for all of us. There are potentially other pieces of legislation in the works to weaken Title IX even more and very soon the U.S. Senate may vote to confirm Kenneth Marcus as Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights at the Department of Education. Mr. Marcus has a history of supporting policies not in line with AAUW's Public Policy Priorities. Additionally, during his confirmation hearing he did not commit to strong enforcement of Title IX and other civil rights laws. AAUW is asking members to call their legislators to ask them to protect Title IX and vote to not confirm Mr. Marcus.

In The Statehouse In Healthcare News, States React Differently to Attacks on Obamacare



There are many positive changes that have taken place because of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) like increasing the number of Americans who have access to preventive services and also lowering the rate of uninsured women. Unfortunately, Congress is still taking steps to undo the law. Some states are taking measures to strengthen the law, while others are rejecting it. In New Jersey two bills were passed, one creating a reinsurance plan and the other requiring everyone have insurance or pay a penalty. A few states are considering expanding Medicaid. Other states are actively working to withdraw from the mandates of the ACA. The Iowa legislature just voted to offer smaller plans with inferior benefits. Of note is that AAUW members in Idaho are advocating to expand Medicaid through a vote on a ballot measure. The measure failed and AAUW continued the fight by working to pass legislation to close the coverage gap and provide insurance for thousands of individuals who cannot currently afford it, including a large percentage of women.

The 2018 Name Grant award was given to Karen Landstrom.

Karen's nomination noted that while her teaching job limits her ability to participate in branch activities during the school year, she has been a long and faithful member of the Art Fair on the Green committee.



Karen has been the raffle chair or co-chair for many years. She has not only organized the collection and labeling process but also changed the layout to make it more efficient and visually appealing. The raffle as a fundraiser has grown both in scope and funds raised.

- May 29, 1977 Janet Guthrie becomes the first woman to qualify for and complete the Indy 500 car race.
