The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap

We continue to hear that women still only make 80 cents on each dollar that men earn. But why does the pay gap persist in 2018, with women achieving so many gains in education, in politics, and in the workplace?

AAUW's The Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap, Fall 2018 Edition report indicates that, at the rate of change between 1960 and 2017, women are expected to reach pay equity with men in 2059. However, progress has stalled in recent years and if wage patterns continue, women will not reach pay equity until 2106. The pay gap not only stays with women throughout their careers, but also follows them into retirement, resulting in women earning less money than men do in terms of pensions, Social Security, and other sources.

The pay discrepancy has also been calculated at the state level, with Wisconsin women earning 80% of what men in the state make. This is an improvement since the 2017 report was published, when Wisconsin's working women were at only 78%. The median annual earnings for fulltime, year-round male workers in Wisconsin was \$51,346 in 2017; \$40.930 for females in the same categories. Across all racial and ethnic groups, American women now earn more college and postgraduate degrees than men. However, women with college degrees who work full-time make, on average, 26 percent less than their male peers with college degrees. Although women with degrees have higher earnings than women without degrees, men with degrees have even higher earnings. Men are therefore able to pay off educational student loans much more quickly than are women.

So, what causes the pay gap overall? One discrepancy is occupational segregation. Women are disproportionately represented in education, office and administrative support, and

health care occupations. Men, on the other hand, are disproportionately represented in construction, maintenance and repair, and production and transportation occupations. The work that women do is valued less than work done by men precisely because that work is done by women. Even within the same occupations, men are paid more than women.

Other factors working against women's pay equity include the "motherhood penalty" (employers are less likely to hire mothers and to pay them less when they are hired) and the "fatherhood bonus"(many fathers actually receive higher wages after having a child.)

What can we do to help close the gender pay gap? AAUW recommends a multi-pronged approach, focusing on individuals, employers, and federal and state governments.

At the individual level, it has been socially acceptable for



men to negotiate for higher salaries, but not for women. AAUW has developed Start Smart and Work Smart to train women in negotiation skills, both when accepting a first job as well as further along their career paths. AAUW's goal is "training 10 million women to negotiate their financial futures by 2022."

There are many practices employers can voluntarily implement to help close the wage gap. Three federal bills, proposed in 1994 (Fair Pay Act), 1997 (Paycheck Fairness Act), and 2016 (Pay Equity for All Act) have not been passed, as of the current 115th Congress.
