on regional economic development in the tri-state area, which includes La Crosse. One of their initiatives is called Inspire 7 Rivers. This initiative links education and industry to help students and job seekers achieve their goals and to address workforce development needs. Mr. Hardie will share the details of this initiative.

Hardie took over the Black River Area Chamber of Commerce in March 2015 after more than 30 years in the newspaper business. He worked with local leaders to help establish a Jackson County Economic Development Committee, organized a pop-up retail program with the Black River Falls Downtown Association, and owns/operates Brambleberry Country Inn and Winery. Hardie has also served on various regional boards, including the Tomah Area Chamber of Commerce, the Village People in West Salem, the Greater La Crosse Area Chamber of Commerce, the La Crosse Area Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and served as president of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association.





Effects of the Government Shutdown on Women and Children

AAUW has long advocated for women in the areas of civil rights, economic security, education, and Title IX regulations. This advocacy has never been more important than today, in a time when the government shutdown drastically affects women and children. For example, 3% of the American population lives in HUD (Housing and Urban development, or "public housing") housing. Of those families living in HUD housing,

75% of them are headed by women. As of today's writing, the HUD website states that HUD is closed due to the government shutdown. This means that after pre-authorized money runs out, there will be no more funds allocated to HUD tenants. Funding for WIC (Women, Infants,



The shutdown affects women's reproductive health and the health of their newborns. Dr. Tracey Woodruff is a professor of obstetrics, gynecology, and reproductive services at the University of California San Francisco. One of the things she studies is how prenatal exposure to pollutants and other chemicals can adversely affect prenatal development. She said that the government shutdown affects grant funding, which causes delays in research.



"A cascade of effects can happen as we wait to make decisions about chemicals that can be influencing people's health," Woodruff says.

The third example of how the shutdown affects women involves cessation of funding for programs that help crime victims, stop sexual violence against women, and prevent sexual assault. The Department of Commerce has stopped getting federal reimbursement for these programs, and funding for the Violence Against Women Act has also stopped due to the government shutdown. This puts women's lives in danger, according to Toni Van Pelt, President of the National Organi-

> zation of Women. About one in three women and one in six men in the U.S. experience some form of contact sexual violence in their lifetime, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. One in six women and one in 19 men in the U.S. experience stalking at some point during their lifetime. Since the #MeToo movement began, organizations that serve assault victims are reporting record numbers of

people seeking help.

Now more than ever, it is important to stand with AAUW as our organization continues to campaign on behalf of women during this time fraught with threats to women and children.

Women's March in Madison 2019

Twenty three women and men from La Crosse traveled by coach to Madison, February 19, for the WOMEN'S WAVE WISCONSIN 2019. This was the third year for the Women's March.

They disembarked at 10:00 AM to temperatures in the single digits with a wind speed of 12 mph. There was no place to shelter from the frigid weather outside. However, organizers had prepared a room on the second floor of the Capitol, right off the rotunda, where the live-stream video of the speak-

ers outside could be viewed. It was very much appreciated by this writer after an hour and a half in the elements! I commend the majority of the estimated crowd of 700 who weathered the cold and were acknowledged for their constancy by each speaker!

Among the many issues highlighted were immigration, education, healthcare, equal pay, gender neutrality, religious freedom, xenophobia, indigenous rights, race, class, abuse, sexual orientation...all the things that are present in our state by policy and action, impacting the experiences of many during their lives.

Speakers included State Treasurer Sarah Godlewski who referenced voters' rights when she said, "We need fair maps. In states that have fair maps, not only are women running for office, they are WINNING! Let's put an end to gerrymandering!" The speaker who was an exemplar of the injustices suffered by many in our nation was Rhiannon Plotkin, a twelve year-old girl who was delivering her first political speech. She told of her mother who was deported when Rhiannon

was a small child living in Arizona. She and her father now live in Waukesha, still hoping that her mother will some day join them to recreate their family. Many other activists were there representing organizations, cultures, and professions in Wisconsin.



The rally moved into the Capitol building to deliver the Womens' Agenda around 12:30 PM while giving voice to various chants emblematic of the causes for which we gathered. People were present around all three levels of the Rotunda where we vigorously declared our beliefs. Then the rally dispersed while joining the Raging Grannies in their protest songs.
