## PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE: The Special Month of March

Happy March! I was wondering how this month became Women's History Month and about the origin of International Women's Day. So I did a little

research and here is what I learned. The first National Woman's Day was celebrated in the U.S. on

February 28, 1909. The Socialist Party of America designated this day in honor of the 1908 garment workers' strike in New York, at which women protested their working conditions. In 1911 International Woman's Day was observed for the first time on March 19 in Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland, where more than one million women and men attended rallies. In 1913 and 1914 International Woman's Day also became a mechanism for opposing World War I. In the post-1945 period the name changed from the singular "woman's" day to plural "women's" day. In 1975, International Women's Year, the

United Nations began celebrating International Women's Day on its current date of March 8. IWD is now observed in more than 100 countries and is an official holiday in

International Women's Day 27 nations. The designation of March as Women's History Month has a much more recent beginning. The Education Task Force of

the Sonoma County (California) Commission on the Status of Women planned and carried out a Women's History Week in 1978. The week of March 8 was chosen to correspond with International Women's Day. In

1980 a consortium of women's groups and historians, led by the National Women's History Project (now the National Women's History Alliance), lobbied for national recognition. As a result, in February 1980 President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the week of March 8th that year as National Women's History Week. Subsequent Presidents continued to proclaim a National Women's History Week in March until 1987 when Congress passed Public Law 100-9, designating March as Women's History Month. A special Presidential Proclamation is issued every year which honors the extraordinary achievements of American women.

This month in La Crosse please read the inspirational women's biographies in the Tribune each day, admire the window display at Pearl Street Books, and attend the International Women's Day Celebration. Many individuals in AAUW In Action and the IWD Celebration Committee, especially Lois Gilbert and Erica Koonmen, have worked hard to make March 2019 memorable.

# **Public Policy**

#### **Encouraging Women to Run for Office**

Out of over 500,000 elected offices in the United States, fewer than 1/3 of them are held by women (Source: https://www. sheshouldrun.org/). Even though women make up 50.8% of the United States population, they only account for 19.6% of the U.S. Congress, and 25% of the U.S. Senate. Since Hillary Clinton's loss in 2016, women have shown a renewed interest in running for office. AAUW advocates for women's rights in education, reproductive health, and economic security. One way AAUW continues to promote these rights is by sponsoring programs that can help steer women towards politics. AAUW recently incorporated their program Elect Her into an existing program Running Start, founded in 2007. Running **Start** is a non-partisan organization specializing in supporting high school and college women. Their Young Women's Political Leadership Program helps young women in high school develop leadership skills and expand their political interests. Running Start also hosts a political caucus that allows women to learn about public policy and to make connections. There are other organizations designed to introduce women to running for office. She Should Run, a nonpartisan, not for profit organization based out of Washington DC, has helped 26,000 women run for office. The organization's goal is to have 250,000 women in office by 2030. Since its inception in 1985, *Emily's List* (short for Early Money is Like Yeast, i.e. it makes the dough rise) has helped elect twelve governors, twenty-three senators, one hundred and sixteen House representatives and over eight hundred women to state and local office. Like She Should Run, Emily's list also hosts candidate trainings for women who want to run for office. The National Women's Political Caucus (NWPC), founded in 1971, has 25 training programs for progressive, pro-choice women. These programs cover topics like time management, confidence building, and online fundraising. Some of the candidates endorsed by the NWPC include Tammy Baldwin, Elizabeth Warrens, Donna Shalala, and Dianne Feinstein. The Women's Campaign Fund (WCF), founded in 1974, supports women who can demonstrate the ability to reach common ground in their life's experiences, and who are viable for election. This means the WCF seeks women "whose gifts include strong basic competencies, plus guts, street sense, situational awareness, and resilience." They support candidates who demonstrate that they respect different perspectives. Some of the candidates the WCF endorses are Stacey Abrams, Heidi Heitkamp, and Veronica Escobar.

If you are thinking about running for office, or if you know someone who could be encouraged to run for office, AAUW and other organizations can give you the support and knowledge you need. Please see the next item for a workshop coming to La Crosse on H March 2nd!

# Vote Yes for Fair Maps on April 2

The League of Women Voters of the La Crosse Area asked the La Crosse County Board to vote on putting the question, "Should the Wisconsin Legislature create a non-partisan procedure for preparing legislative and congressional redistricting plans?" on the April 2 ballot as an advisory referendum. The County Board voted unanimously to place this question on the ballot. The same redistricting referendum will be on the ballot in Vernon County. Six other Wisconsin counties have previously passed referenda on redistricting.

Redistricting is a non-partisan issue and falls under AAUW's public policy priorities of citizen participation and accountable administration and advocating for public discussion to ensure enlightened decisions.

The next step for the League along with other non-partisan partners is to educate voters about the redistricting referendum before the April 2 election. Following the April election, the groups will continue to actively follow this issue with continued public education and advocacy efforts with the goal of persuading Wisconsin legislators to act on redistricting reform during the 2019-2020 session, ensuring a new non-partisan process is in place prior to the 2021 redistricting.



To help educate the public, the League and our partners are hosting a forum at **7:00** *pm on Wednesday, March 27 in Collins Auditorium at Viterbo University's School of Nursing Building* (next to the Fine Arts Center). Parking is available in the Fine Arts Center lot along Jackson Street.

Erin Gunze, Executive Director for the Wisconsin League of Women Voters, and Matt Rothsihild, Executive Director for Wisconsin Democracy Campaign, along with Tara Johnson, La Crosse County Board Chair, will serve on the panel.

Fair maps are the cornerstone of our democracy, reduce political gridlock, make elections meaningful, and save taxpayer dollars.
