#### Start Smart and Work Smart

Full-time working women in the U.S. continue to earn only 80% of their male counterparts' pay. Black and Hispanic women earn even less. Even just one year out of college, women are paid 18% less than men. "While the pay gap results from many factors – including discrimination – gender differences in salary negotiation play a role," according to AAUW. Women learning to confidently negotiate their salaries will help ensure that they earn the pay and benefits they deserve.

The AAUW Salary Negotiation Program has developed two workshops, Start Smart and Work Smart, both offered at no charge face-to-face and online. Start Smart is for college women approaching the job market. Work Smart is designed for women who are already in the workforce at any career level. AAUW's goal is to train 10 million women in salary negotiation by 2022. To that end, AAUW Wisconsin has set salary negotiation as one of the priorities in its strategic plan, Vision 2019-2021. The state and national organization strongly encourage all AAUW members to take one of the online workshops and AAUW Wisconsin has mandated that branch board members do so by January 18, 2020. To find the workshops please go to AAUW.org and type "Work Smart" or "Start Smart" in the search box. Although I am retired, I found it helpful to think back to previous work situations as I proceeded through the Work Smart online module.

# **Public Policy**

Many populations have been negatively affected since the 2016 election. The Human Rights Watch, originally founded as the "Helsinki Watch" in 1976, reports in their 2019



newsletter that the Trump administration has passed a plethora of laws, implemented regulations, and carried out policies that violate or undermine human rights. These actions affect criminal sentencing, racial disparity in criminal justice and drug policy, the people targeted by hate

crimes, and the rights of non-citizens to name a few. Women and girls, especially low-income and uninsured women, have also felt the effects of these laws, regulations, and policies. For example, in March of 2019, Trump's Fiscal Year 2020 budget proposal recommended flat-funding Title X at \$286.5 million. "Current funding levels are less than 40% of what is needed to meet the need for publicly funded family planning in this country," according to analyses published in the American Journal of Public Health, which found that Title X would need \$737 million annually to meet the need for its services. Facilities that receive Title X funding provide critical preventative health care services. Of the clients served by Title X facilities, 78% of them have incomes below 150% of the federal poverty level.

In another example, as the #MeToo movement expands, the Senate confirmed Brett Kavanaugh to a lifetime seat on the Supreme Court despite allegations of sexual assault. At the same time, the administration moved to eliminate domestic violence as a reason for granting asylum as well as redefined domestic violence to include only physical harm that constitutes a felony or misdemeanor. Psychological abuse, coercive control, and manipulation are no longer considered domestic abuse. Holly Taylor-Dunn, a researcher in sexual and domestic violence said, "It is guite scary how quietly it has happened. It is a massive step backwards. We have literally gone back to the 70s. We have worked so hard since the 60s and 70s to get domestic abuse and sexual violence understood as being about more than physical violence. Changing the definition to take it back to being about physical harm completely undermines what domestic abuse is about."

During these challenging times, it is vital that we continue to support AAUW in their work championing women's rights. 2020 is a critical election year. You can learn to help get out the vote and advocate for AAUW's issues by attending the AAUW WI Public Policy Day on Saturday November 2, 2019 at the Madison Technical College Truax Campus. The event runs from 9 to 3 and includes presentations by Matt Rothschild, Executive Director of the Wisconsin Democracy Campaign, and a speaker from the WI Alliance of Women's Health.
