SCHOLARSHIP & GRANT COMMITTEE REPORT by Robert Richardson, Co-Chair

Every year is a great year for the SGC. NOTE: If you would like to join this dynamic group, please let us know!

FIRST: SGC would not exist were it not for:

1) The Art Fair on the Green and all the many volunteers that make that event possible.

2) The sagacious branch leaders who invested Art Fair proceeds across 6 decades.

3) Stellar management of AAUW Funds at the La Crosse Community Foundation (LCF).

SGC meets in October to:

1) review scholarship application templates to make sure that our applicants provide us the information that we need to make informed decisions during the review process AND

2) design the process by which we review grants-awarded and grants-to-consider.

SGC co-chairs distribute scholarship applications on November 1st. Branch members look for women students 30 years and older to nominate for the Karen Wilson Scholarship.

SGC members research grant recipients and nominations November through January. Grant consideration is given only to those agencies which align with the AAUW mission.

SGC co-chairs confer in January with the Art Fair chair, the branch Board, and the LCF to determine funds available to award in grants and scholarships.

SGC members meet in February to:

1) review research findings and determine grant recipients and

2) begin meeting in subcommittees to review scholarship applications (due by the first Sunday in February).

SGC co-chairs prepare materials and recommendations for the Independent Selection Committee to review. ISC validates our scholarship recipients, as required by the LCF.

SGC members announce grant recipients at the April branch meeting.

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2021-2022 Name Grant Awarded

At the April 9 meeting, Joan Koonmen was awarded the 2021-2022 AAUW La Crosse Name Grant in recognition of her work for the branch. Joan first joined the branch in 1956 as a young mother of two. She was active over the next several years, participating in study groups as well as sewing outfits for her daughter to model in AAUW fashion show fundraisers and design-



ing posters for AAUW children's theater productions. Most notable, however, is that Joan served as the first chair of Art Fair on the Green.

Joan and her family (which now included five children) moved away from the area in 1968. She returned in 2013 and re-joined AAUW La Crosse. The 2021-2022 Name Grant Committee -- consisting of Betty Kruck, Carol Robertson, and me – thought it especially appropriate to recognize Joan and her contributions to our branch's legacy as we celebrate our 100-year anniversary.

The Name Grant has been awarded annually for the past 61 years to a branch member who has provided exemplary service to the La Crosse Branch. A donation is sent to the national office of AAUW in the recipient's honor. Previous Name Grant honorees are listed near the end of each year's membership directory.

Public Policy

The State Public Policy committee met many times over this past year to develop two resolutions on which members voted before the state convention last weekend.

One topic of interest was Climate Change Awareness Resolution. Though there are many areas on which AAUW WI can focus, the committee decided that a sustainable and health



environment is critical to women and girls achieving equity. Members voted almost unanimously to support this resolution.

The second topic of interest this year was our response to Critical Race Theory (CRT), a legal term often used incorrectly. The term CRT is being used by political groups to prevent school districts from changing the traditional curriculum to include women and traditionally underserved diverse population. AAUW WI's members voted again almost unanimously to support culturally responsive and inclusive curriculum.

AAUW's CEO Gloria Blackwell-spoke to us Friday night at our state convention, reminding us of our 140 year legacy and of the work ahead of us. A few weeks before the convention, Blackwell commended Ketanji Brown Jackson for being confirmed by a bipartisan vote as associate justice to the Supreme Court of the United States. Blackwell stated that AAUW has been there to see



Sandra Day O'Connor become the first female Supreme Court Justice, to see Nancy Pelosi elected speaker of the House of Representatives, to see Hillary Clinton run as the first female nominee for President, and to see Kamala Harris become Vice President of the United States. Blackwell reminded us of the fight for women's equality in

Historian's Corner

As May is our month to honor our scholarship recipients, following is a brief history of this branch tradition.

The 1930's saw the establishment of a \$1000 fund with the State Teachers College Foundation. The annual interest was usually sufficient for a scholarship, but when interest was too low the branch made up the difference. During the 1940's, the fund was increased. With more fund raisers in the 1950's our own fund was created which initially gave \$200 scholarships to seniors at local high schools.

When keeping accounts by the branch treasurer became too cumbersome, the La Crosse Branch Foundation was established as a non-profit corporation in 1967. As assets grew, more high school scholarships were given and scholarships for Viterbo and Technical College students were introduced.

Later, a scholarship for women over age 30 was created honoring member Karen Wilson who was a professor at UW-L and passed away too young. We joined the La Crosse Tribune's Extra Effort Award program donating two scholarships. When long time art fair chair and music teacher Pat Staupe died, we added a scholarship in her name for a student in Arts Education.

Grants were given to organizations supporting women. An example is the Self Sufficiency Program which helps single mothers to obtain an education. Sending students to the AAUW National Conference for Women Student Leaders near Washington, D.C. is another.

By 2010, when managing the branch foundation was becoming too cumbersome, a fund was established within the La Crosse Community Foundation. Under that umbrella principal grew and we give close to \$30,000 in scholarships and grants per year. As LCF manages accounting and distribution, we are freer to concentrate on fundraising and choosing recipients.

In our 100 years we have given many more scholarships and grants than have been included. This ever-constant need will continue to be addressed by our branch far beyond its first century of accomplishment.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion by June Reinert, DE&I La Crosse Branch Coordinator

Intersectionality and Unconscious Bias

When discussing issues of diversity, equity and inclusion, it is important to understand the nuances of the language we use.

Intersectionality

1: the complex, cumulative way in which the effects of multiple forms of discrimination (such as racism, sexism, and classism) combine, overlap, or intersect especially in the experiences of marginalized individuals or groups

Legal scholar Kimberlé Crenshaw coined the term intersectionality in her work Mapping the Margins. She noted that scholars often look at outcomes for women or for African Americans, but never look at what happens to African American women whose lives are impacted by the ways these multiple sources of oppression interact. Understanding intersectionality gives us a way of understanding the cumulative effect of discrimination and oppression on people. That's not that one person's oppression is greater than another's; it's a way of recognizing that our experiences may not be the same because inequality is a complex phenomenon.

Here's an example familiar to AAUW members: Pay equity. We know that men and women are paid unequally for equal work: on average, women make 82¢ for every dollar that a white man makes. But did you know that moms make 70¢ on that same dollar? Or that Latinas make just 55¢? These are just a few examples of intersectionality and how parental status, or ethnicity intersect with gender to impact pay equity.

Unconscious Bias

Definition of unconscious

- 1: not marked by conscious thought, sensation, or feeling
- 2 : not knowing or perceiving : not aware
- 3 : not consciously held or deliberately planned or carried out

Definition of bias

1 : an inclination of temperament or outlook especially : a personal and sometimes unreasoned judgment : prejudice

We all know what overt biases are, but we all have unconscious biases, too. These are biases that might be inconsistent with our values, that we would never knowingly act on and that we weren't even aware we had. And having them doesn't make us racist or sexist or homophobic, etc... At any given, moment we are bombarded with lots of information, but our brains can only process a fraction of it at once. To help us try and make sense of the world around us, our brain uses short cuts. Those short cuts are shaped and informed by our experiences. But, because sometimes the things we need to make sense of are unfamiliar, bias can enter the picture.

For example, here is an image, what do you see? Triangles, circles? This is the Kanizsa Triangle. Most people see a solid white triangle pointing upwards, an inverted triangle pointing downwards, and a set of black discs. But the fact is, none of these shapes are present in the figure; this image is of "pac-men" and V's, not triangles and circles. This is an example of our unconscious mind using familiar information to try and make sense of what it sees, because in the absence of complete information, our mind needed to rely on something to help us figure it out. So, what can you do?



- 1. Self-awareness is the first step
- 2. Create safe spaces to have open discussions about the biases you have
- 3. Increase your contact with people who are dissimilar
- 4. Set realistic expectations

We're not going to be able to change our unconscious mind over night, but we will be able to make progress. Only when we confront our biases are we able to truly recognize the value diversity brings to an organization like AAUW. It's important for our continued growth and sustainability as an organization to make a concerted effort to be inclusive and create spaces where everyone feels welcome.
