PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE:

Passing the Gavel

I started out last year's June message by saying "Wow, what a year it's been" and those words are fitting again this year. AAUW's mission of equity has never been more important. I continue to believe that lifting women up is critical to healing and revitalizing our country and our world, and I feel so lucky to be part of a group that believes the same thing.

While women have made IT'S BEEN A GREAT RIDE some progress towards equity this year – think the confirmation of Supreme Court Justice Kentaii Brown Jackson on April 7th – women face a crushing setback if Roe v. Wade is overturned. According to NPR, if Roe is overturned, 58% of women who are in the reproductive age will live in states hostile to abortion. More than 20 states have "trigger laws" set to take effect when Roe is overturned. These laws will drastically restrict or even ban abortion. When I hear people supporting anti-abortion measures, I answer, "Therefore, you must be in supportive of equal pay for women, free quality reproductive care, and child support beginning at conception, correct?" If the answer is "no," or simply met with a blank stare, I know the issue is not about abortion but about controlling

women. We must continue to insist on equal pay and equal rights for women.

The Equal Rights Amendment has been 100 years in the making. Our social media coordinator Erica Koonmen just posted a message on
