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PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE:

Springing with Energy

AAUW-La Crosse Branch marched into spring with energy, creativity, and organizing *acumen. We came together in committees, meetings, collaborations to "advance equity for women and girls through advocacy (DEI initiatives & AIA events), education (International Women's Day, monthly programs), philanthropy (S&G and Art Fair) and

research (Women's History Month)." Our March-ing has made good things happen, for our members, branch, community, and beyond.

I've been thinking about how all this work happens and what makes our Branch so effective. (Please see my note on the word "acumen" for a clue.) I think uncovering the "why" of the work is even more important, and found in the interplay of ideas and purpose, heart and relationships. Perhaps these questions will spark some reflection and discussion for you:

What fueled your interest and involvement in AAUW? What keeps you involved? What challenges have you faced in maintaining your involvement? What "big ideas," people, and individual experiences have shaped your life and individual commitments, paid and unpaid work, involvement in AAUW and other community organizations?

I'll share a bit of my story: In my second semester at Roanoke College (1977-78), I was introduced to the "sociological imagination," a concept coined in the late 50's by C. Wright Mills. This asserts that in order to "see right," one must be able to "translate personal troubles into public issues." This is done by placing our experience within the historical, cultural, and structural

context. It requires paying attention, asking critical questions about systems and power, and making connections with our lives and circumstances. I became a sociology major.

I was primed to understand the meanings and implications of the feminist rallying cry "the personal is political", coined by editors of Notes from the Second Year: Women's Liberation, published in 1970. In the essay with this as its title, Carol Hanisch wrote, "One of the first things we discover in these (consciousness-raising) groups is that personal problems are

political problems. There are no personal solutions at this time. There is only collective action for collective solutions." I embraced feminism and activism, working in the movements to end violence against women as a grad student and then in my paid and unpaid work.

Let me acknowledge the support and work that flowed from our long-time and past Branch members. In the small and larger organizations I worked in through the '80's, AAUW's research papers and advocacy efforts helped to inform and empower our work. Clearly, the dynamic intersectional work flowing from increasingly diverse voices, communities, organizations and disciplines continues to enliven, challenge and shape our work and our understandings. It's exciting and challenging, too!

The upcoming vote on the proposed by-law that makes support of AAUW's mission the sole requirement for membership provides an opportunity to exercise your "sociological imagination," in evaluating the information, taking a position, and casting your vote.

Our work resides in an alarming political/global context that shifts my feminist and sociological imagination into overdrive. I see our work as AAUW providing an accessible counterbalance to the uncertainty and chaos that are so present and alarming. Historian Timothy Snyder places our work in this larger context and identifies Lesson #15 "Contribute to Good Causes" in his small book, On Tyranny: 20 Lessons from the Twentieth Century (2017). Snyder advises, "Be active in organizations, political or not, that express your own view of life...you will have made a free choice that supports civil society and helps other to do good." He writes, "The capacity for trust and learning can make life seem less chaotic and mysterious, and democratic politics more plausible and attractive."

For me, I find it essential to place AAUW in this big picture. Like millions of other organizations and individuals, we are living out our commitments to democracy and justice, and practicing the critical values equity, diversity, and inclusion. We do it locally and collectively, setting a good example for generations to come.

*According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, **acumen** implies "a searching mind that goes beyond what is obvious or superficial...combined with keen practical judgement."

Seems an apt descriptor of our members, our Branch and how we get things done!

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Difficult Conversations



Try to think of the last time you had a conversation that was not easy: How did you feel before you began talking? How did you feel once the conversation ended? Did you accomplish your goals? In this post, we will examine ways to begin a difficult conversation, specifically related to

diversity and inclusion. We aim to provide tools to make these conversations meaningful and productive.

"How do we Get Started with Difficult Conversations". Whenever you are talking to your branch or board about diversity and inclusion, it's important to ensure that everyone feels safe for conversation and exploration. Because some activities explore potentially sensitive topics, it's a good idea to establish some norms to provide ground rules for your conversation and to ensure that space feels safe for conversation and exploration. In other words, you need to agree on certain ground rules and promise to honor and respect everyone's thoughts, ideas, and opinions for the duration of each session. Examples of ground rules might include:

- · Speak from the "I" perspective: Avoid speaking for others by using "we," "us," or "them."
- · Listen actively: Listen to understand, not to respond. Sometimes we are tempted to begin formulating what we want to say in response, instead of giving 100 percent of our focus to the speaker. So, let's make sure we are listening 100 percent.
- · Step up, step back: If you usually speak up often or find yourself talking more than others, challenge yourself to lean into listening and opening space for others. If you don't usually talk as much in groups and do a lot of your thinking and processing in your head, know that we would love to hear your contributions and challenge you to add your voice to the conversation.
- · Respect silence: Don't force yourself to fill silence. Silence can be an indication of thought and process.
- · Share, even if you don't have the right words: Suspend judgment and allow others to be unpolished in their speaking. If you are unsure of their meaning, ask for clarification.
- · Uphold confidentiality: Treat the candor of others as a gift. Assume that personal identities, experiences, and shared perspectives are confidential unless you are permitted to use them.
- · Lean into discomfort: Learning happens on the edge of our comfort zones. Push yourself to be open to new ideas and experiences even if they initially seem uncomfortable to you.
