Women entrepreneurs contribute to



Changes Coming for NCCWSL

The La Crosse Branch has been sponsoring, for a number of years, local college students to attend NCCWSL (National Conference for College Women Student Leaders). The conference has been held annually in Washington, DC and occurs at the end of the school year in late May and early June. We have heard glowing comments from students who have attended. They talk about the great networking opportunities and the presentations on issues such as job hunting and career advice, women's rights, and reproductive freedom.

We were recently notified by Shannon Wolfe, Managing Director and Chief of Staff at AAUW's national office, that NCCWSL as we know it will cease to exist. NCCWSL will subsumed by NASPA, Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education.

Beginning with the 2025 NASPA conference NCCWSL and AAUW will have a presence. There will be AAUW speakers, exhibitors, and presenters. NASPA will be responsible for planning and organizing the conference, including registration. AAUW Speaks Out Forcefully Against the Attacks on DEI

AAUW publicly denounced efforts to restrict diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives at colleges and universities in Iowa and Florida. The association took aim at state laws which have aggressively sought to dismantle DEI programs at institutions of higher learning.

"Universities are where students go to expand their knowledge and experiences," said Gloria L. Blackwell, Chief Executive Officer of AAUW. "But politicians in Iowa and Florida are forcing their agenda on higher education, policing what students see and learn and how universities manage their affairs. These cowardly attacks by right-wing state legislatures are a direct response to the progress made by women and people of color."

Increasingly, more states are cracking down on providing funding to their public institutions that embrace DEI initiatives. That, says, Blackwell, is reason for concern. "Diversity, equity, and inclusion gave us the 15th and 19th Amendments, expanding the political process to include voices across racial and gender lines by giving people of color and women the right to vote," she said. "The need for equity and inclusion gave us Title IX, which prohibited sex-based discrimination in educational settings. While many want to make 'DEI' into a slur, the values of diversity, equity, and inclusion make us a stronger and more equitable nation."

"Despite progress, there is still much work needed to break down barriers to full access, opportunity and participation in higher education for all," she said. "Iowa and Florida's hostility toward women and people of color is part of a larger trend that reaches all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. AAUW remains committed to our mission of advancing gender equity for women — especially women of color — through education and advocacy."

Convention Corner April 25-26, 2025

As you recall, the 2025 AAUW-Wisconsin Convention will be held April 25 and 26 at the Stoney Creek Hotel and Conference Center in Onalaska.

This will be the 104th state convention. The planning committee has been hard at work lining up speakers, planning meals, and all of the other tasks that go into organizing a large convention.

Keynote speakers have not yet been finalized, but there will be break-out session presentations on a variety of interesting topics, including persons with disabilities, science education using artificial intelligence, big money and political corruption, "Uncovering the Lost Histories of Women," the Holocaust, and women's health.

December Diversity Calendar 2024 Highlights

World AIDS Day – December 1

World AIDS Day is observed annually to unite people worldwide in the fight against HIV, show support for those living with HIV, and commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, it was the first ever global health day. Participate in local events or wear a red ribbon to show your support.

International Day for the Abolition of Slavery – December 2

Slavery isn't just something from the past. Nearly 40 million people across the world are in modern slavery and live in forced labor and marriages or human trafficking. The UN created this diversity day to raise awareness on how to work to eradicate this modern slavery form.

International Day of Persons with Disabilities – December 3

Today, we promote the well-being and equal rights of people with disabilities. This call-to-action day aims to improve their living conditions and raise awareness about how to work toward accessibility in every aspect of society. We hope to better understand the challenges they face while focusing on breaking down barriers and building a more inclusive world for everyone.

International Human Solidarity Day – December 20

Today is dedicated to raising awareness of the importance of solidarity to help advance the eradication of poverty. The first day featured a keynote address from Lech Walesa, the former president of Poland and the cofounder of the labor union Solidarity, which inspired this movement.

Christmas – December 25

Christmas is one of the most cherished Christian holidays commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. Observed by millions around the world, both religiously and culturally, this day is marked by attending church services, exchanging gifts, and festive family gatherings. Decorations include Christmas trees, lights, and nativity scenes that symbolize joy and peace.

Kwanzaa – December 26 – January 1, 2025

The week-long celebration celebrates African American heritage and culture. Each day features a different principle including unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.

DEI Thoughts

The 2024 US election has left many women grappling with concerns about the future. From potential shifts in reproductive rights to fears about economic inequality, the political climate feels uncertain. While these concerns are valid, it's important to separate actionable challenges from overblown fears. Businesses, through DEI initiatives, have the power to offer stability and support for women during times of change.

1. *Reproductive Rights Concerns: What's Next?* The election has heightened anxieties about potential restrictions on reproductive healthcare. However, while federal actions might shape policies, many states continue to uphold protections for women's reproductive rights.

How DEI Can Help: Workplaces can support women by ensuring comprehensive healthcare benefits that include reproductive services, counseling, and family planning resources. Employers can also create environments where women feel safe discussing healthcare needs without stigma.

2. Workplace Equality: Progress Will Not Stall Some fear that the election signals a halt to progress on workplace equality, but that's not necessarily the case. Many organizations have already adopted DEI strategies that prioritize pay equity, leadership opportunities for women, and bias reduction. These efforts are driven by business goals and consumer expectations, not just politics.

How DEI Can Help: Organizations can double down on equitable hiring practices, mentorship programs, and leadership development initiatives. By continuing these efforts, they send a clear message that progress for women remains a priority, regardless of political climates.


