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PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE:

A Cold Reality: Addressing Homelessness and Disabilities in La Crosse

As we step into the new year, many of us are still reflecting on the warmth and togetherness of the holiday season. However, for some members of our community, this time of year is marked not by celebration but by survival. Winter is a particularly harsh season for those experiencing homelessness, and for individuals with disabilities, the challenges can be life-threatening.

According to the most recent data from the World Population Review (2024), La Crosse is a city of about 50,878 people. Alarmingly, on any given night, approximately 150-160 individuals, or 0.32% of our population,

are unsheltered—one of the highest rates in the state. Behind these numbers are real people, many of whom are individuals with disabilities who face unique and severe challenges in securing safe and stable housing.

The intersection of disability and homelessness is a result of systemic inequities. Many individuals with disabilities live on limited incomes that make securing and maintaining housing nearly impossible. Supplemental Security Income (SSI), a lifeline for many, falls far short of covering housing costs in most communities. Accessible housing is even scarcer, and the few options that do exist are often unaffordable.

The winter months amplify these challenges. Sub-zero temperatures, icy streets, and insufficient shelter accommodations can make survival incredibly difficult. Individuals with mobility challenges may struggle to access warming centers, while those with chronic health conditions or mental illnesses may find traditional homeless

services ill-

equipped to meet their needs.

Local organizations and shelters are doing incredible work to support those

in need, but they cannot do it alone. As members of AAUW, we have a role to play. We can raise awareness about this issue, support initiatives that provide housing and services, and advocate for

Keynote Speakers for Convention Announced

The convention planning committee has announced two outstanding keynote speakers for the AAUW-WI 2025 Convention (April 25-26, Stoney Creek Hotel in Onalaska).



One is Amanda Florence Garcia Goodenough of the La Crosse area. Amanda is currently Lead Executive Officer and Founder of Goodenough Consulting, LLC. Prior to assuming

that position, she worked for 17 years as the Director of the Research and Resource Center for Campus Climate at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. Amanda serves on the boards of numerous organizations focused on justice, equity, decolonization, and interconnectedness. Her honors include the Social Justice Achievement Award for the YWCA Tribute to Outstanding Women (2010) and the La Crosse Area Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Award (2021). The title of Amanda's convention presentation is "Welcome to the Struggle..."

Another keynote is Lynda Drews of Green Bay. Lynda is the author of three acclaimed books: The Maid and the Socialite: The Brave Women Behind Green Bay's Scandalous Minahan Trials; Run at Destruction: A True Fatal Love Triangle; and Circle of Innocence. Lynda's keynote address, "Uncovering the Lost Histories of Women," will discuss the true story behind The Maid and the Socialite. The historical nonfiction book, written in the victims' voices, uncovers the truth about the women's abuser, a famous Green Bay surgeon. Midwest Book Review indicates that the book is "written with the drama of fiction and the compelling research of fact." Lynda was employed at IBM for 30 years before retiring to a writing career.

Gender equality cannot wait any longer. We need the ERA to strengthen protections against gender discrimination in education, the workplace, access to reproductive healthcare, and so much more.

The U.S. Mint has revealed the five historical female figures who will appear on the reverse sides of quarters for 2025, the last year it will issue American Women Quarters Program coins featuring iconic American women.

The trailblazing women to be featured on the tail side of coins are Ida B. Wells, Juliette Gordon Low, Dr. Vera Rubin, Stacey Park Milbern and Althea Gibson. Images of all the coins can be found **here**.

2025 will mark the fourth and final year of the program, which will have issued 20 new quarters featuring the images of trailblazing figures from diverse ethnic, racial and geographic backgrounds. The head side of the coins feature Founding Father George Washington.

Jessye Norman is not only one of the world's most admired and beloved singers, she is an American icon whose life story is as moving and dramatic as the

great operatic roles she has performed on stage.

Born and raised in Augusta, Georgia, nurtured in a close family and tight-knit community centered around the church, she studied the piano and sang the songs of her childhood, not dreaming that this passion for music might lead to her life's profession.

In Stand Up Straight and Sing!, Jessye Norman recalls in rich detail the strong women who were her role models, from her ancestors to family friends, relatives, and teachers. She describes coming face-to-face with racism, not just as a child living in the segregated South, but also as an adult out and about in the world.

She speaks of the many who have inspired her and taught her essential life lessons. A special interlude on her key relationship with the pioneering African American singer Marian Anderson reveals the lifelong support that this great predecessor provided through her example of dignity and grace at all times.
