I wanted to update you on the article I wrote in last month's newsletter about possibly dismantling the U.S. Department of Education.

This week, we received communication from the AAUW Executive Director, Gloria Blackwell, regarding the Executive Order to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education and urged us to take immediate action to protect the students we advocate for in AAUW. She states, "The American Association of University Women (AAUW) unequivocally condemns President Trump's executive order "Improving Education Outcomes by Empowering Parents, States, and Communities," dismantling the U.S. Department of Education.

"This reckless and shortsighted action threatens to gut vital protections that ensure equal access to higher education and will have devastating consequences for students — especially women, students of color, and those from low-income backgrounds — who rely on federal oversight for their right to an equitable education," said Gloria L. Blackwell, CEO of AAUW. "Eliminating the Department of Education would decimate federal civil rights enforcement, slash protections against gender-based discrimination, and roll back decades of progress toward making higher education accessible and affordable. This decision is not about streamlining government but about stripping students of their rights and futures."

Consequences of this action may include:

- · Low-income students may lose vital federal financial aid that makes it possible to earn their degrees.
- Survivors of sexual harassment and assault on campus may see more Title IX cases dismissed and drastically weakened pathways to justice.
- Students with disabilities could be left without critical safe guards to protect and enforce their rights in schools.
- LGBTQ+ students who experience harassment and discrimi nation could face unsafe environments without their schools being held accountable.
- Student loan borrowers may be more vulnerable to abuse by predatory for-profit colleges and noncompliant servicers while facing unaffordable repayments;

AAUW urges Congress to oppose this move and protect the Department from any further cuts that could hinder the enforcement of federal civil rights laws protecting students and preserving access to higher education. The cost of inaction is too high, and the futures of millions of students, especially those from marginalized communities, hang in the balance.

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## **Scholarships & Grants**

The Scholarships and Grants Committee seeks your feedback to refresh our mindset as we do the work of the SGC on behalf of the branch membership. During our April meeting, we will ask our members to converse and then reference our AAUW mission to rank order the grant and scholarship considerations.

A little background first. We open our annual Directory with the following statements.

Since AAUW's founding in 1881, members have examined and taken positions on the fundamental, equity issues of the day – educational, social, economic and political. AAUW – La Crosse Branch reflects commitment to our mission in all aspects of our work. AAUW advances equity for women & girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. AAUW members belong to a community working together to dismantle the intersecting barriers to education and economic equity.

When documenting criteria for our scholarships and when reviewing completed applications, we consider many factors. We need to make decisions aligned with our mission. We consider GPA, educational goals, likelihood to succeed in studies, documented financial need, situational financial need, home/ school/community involvement, barrier breaking (past, present, future).

For the 2025-26 academic year, we selected 19 scholarship recipients each to receive \$1000 awards. We have long debated increasing our awards to \$1500 or \$2000 and reducing the number of recipients. Money for scholarships is drafted from the AAUW Scholarship Fund at the Community Foundation; money for this fund is generated from the Art Fair.

When researching, reporting, and determining possible grant recipients, we consider many factors. Most organizations brought to our attention do good work, but AAUW La Crosse cannot award unlimited grants. SGC needs to use a model to determine recipients and non-recipients. We need to make decisions aligned with our mission. We consider non-profit organizations' pressing need, impact on community, and impact on individuals.


As a point of reference...we selected seven 2025 grant recipients and increased monetary awards for several.

Three at \$1000: SSP Emergency Fund, WTC Student Assistance Fund, YWCA Restorative Justice Circles.

Four at \$1500: Cia Siab, Inc., Hope Restores, Monroe County Shelter Care (Brighter Tomorrows), New Horizons.

Money for grants is drafted from the Donor Advised Fund at the Community Foundation; money for this fund is generated from individual donations.

We have set aside time at the April meeting for small group discussion on these topics and value your feedback to refine our work as a Committe

# **UWM Afghan Student Update**

Many of you will remember our 2020 -2021 campaign to help Women Afghan Refugees feel welcome and cared for through providing personal care items and notes of encouragement! We were able to sponsor 15 of these amazing young ladies to attend the virtual NCCWSL conference that year. They were so gracious and grateful, while at the same time so strained, worried, and overcome with fear and loneliness for their loved ones.

Following the fall of Afghanistan in August 2021, AAUW members responded with generosity to

provide hope and opportunity to a cohort of Afghan women seeking to continue their university studies in the United States. It is hard to believe that they are about to complete their Junior year at UW-Milwaukee this Spring!

Over the last four years, we have seen this cohort of young women navigate many transitions. They have settled into a new community in Milwaukee, completed the Intensive English Program, pursued their Bachelor's degree fulltime, worked part-time to support themselves and families back home, moved in to their own apartments, cared for fellow Afghan refugees, and advocated for refugees and women's education worldwide.

They are an incredible group. We know it can feel like we are in a particularly divided and uncertain time, but it has been a privilege to be a part of a shared effort between individuals, local faith communities, and public institutions to see these women thrive. It has been a picture of what is possible when we work together.

Thanks to the hard work of UW-Milwaukee staff, we have been able to access grants and awards that have met the majority of the tuition costs for the ASPOM students. Your generous response in 2021 and 2022 has been enough up this point to cover the remaining tuition costs. Now with the students on track in their individual majors and programs, we are able to project what the remaining financial needs is.

We anticipate that an additional \$20,000 is needed to help the seven Afghan women remaining in the ASPOM cohort to complete their Bachelor's degree program at UW-Milwaukee. If you are able to help with this amount, you can learn more about how to make a donation by visiting <u>aspom.org.</u>
