


A Trip to Northern Thailand

- 3) Dues. National has raised its dues, so total Local/Branch/National will equal \$97.00. Some branches are raising their local dues to equal total \$100.00. Discussion. No decision.
- 4) Summer meetings for socializing only, not programming. Discussion. No decision.
